# **May Speaker**

Barbara Garrie lectures on Art History at Canterbury University. Her topic at our May meeting was 'Conceptual Art'. She began by reassuring us that we didn't have to like it. The first image was of Tracey

Emin's "Bed" which was nominated for the Turner Prize, but didn't win it. It was painted in 1998 after a relationship break up.

From here she took us through stages of art and artists from Damian Hurst and the Chapman brothers in the 1980s where the



cynicism of the current culture and political and economic upheaval was shown, via High Art Life which a wider audience would understand. Modernism started in the 1960s with 2 dimensional paintings on flat canvasses and 3-D sculptures. Earlier in the 1950s Jason Pollack painted abstract illusions where the eye had to travel through the painting.

No subject, but more about the materials and the emotional reactions. Part of the post-war expressionism. In the second half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century pop art was recognizable but made fun of the art. People like Donald Judd used industrial materials, symmetry and repetition. It was something between painting and sculpture. Carl Andre used bricks in geometrical shapes.

In conceptual art the idea is paramount and the material unimportant. It's the message, not the medium. Just an idea may develop into some form. It is

not rational but often uses mathematical or geometrical systems. Sometimes it is the planning that counts and a set of instructions is the work so that anyone can actually follow them and draw the art in different locations. Lawrence Weiner just had the statement, "One quart of exterior green industrial enamel thrown on a brick wall". Edward Ruscha published a booklet of 26 black and white gasoline stations he passed on a journey.

In 1990, Anna Chave said that minimalism and conceptual art tend to be masculine and soft flexible things are not valued. In 1992, Janine Antoni gave a performance using her painted body and dye in her hair to make a painting as she rolled around the floor. Barbara recommended watching 'Herb & Dorothy' on You Tube.
